Course description

This course is primarily an examination of the philosophies of Locke and Hume. Among other texts, we will read sizeable portions of Locke's *Essay Concerning Human Understanding*, and of Hume's *Treatise of Human Nature*, *An Enquiry Concerning Human Understanding*, and *Dialogues Concerning Natural Religion*. The goal throughout will be mastery of some of the main ideas and arguments as presented in these texts. Topics to be discussed include the origin of ideas, causation, skepticism, the existence of God, and other topics as well.

Logistics

Evaluation: A midterm at 25% (13 Feb), two papers at 25% each (due 27 Feb and 31 Mar), and a final exam at 25% (date determined by the Registrar's Office for Apr).

Textbook: The textbook for this course is *Readings in Modern Philosophy, Volume II: Locke, Berkeley, Hume and Associated Texts*, edited by Roger Ariew and Eric Watkins (Indianapolis and Cambridge: Hackett, 2000). It has been ordered for this course through the U of T bookstore.

Papers: The first paper will be on Locke, whereas the second paper will be on Hume. For both papers you will have a choice from three topics. Topics and instructions will be posted to Quercus well before the due dates, and papers must be submitted online via Quercus.

Late submissions, extensions, and missed midterms: Late papers will be penalized at 5% for each calendar day, and papers more than one week late will not be accepted. To request an extension for a paper or an alternative date to write a missed midterm, you must submit one of the following types of documentation deemed official by the University: a [Verification of Student Illness or Injury Form](#), a Student Health or Disability Related Certificate, a College Registrar's Letter, or an Accessibility Services Letter.

Email: Only use email for short logistical questions that are not already answered on the syllabus. Philosophical and textual questions are best saved for office hours.

Turnitin.com: Normally, students will be required to submit their papers to Turnitin.com (now incorporated into Quercus) for a review of textual similarity and detection of possible

plagiarism. In doing so, students will allow their papers to be included as source documents in the Turnitin.com reference database, where they will be used solely for the purpose of detecting plagiarism. The terms that apply to the University's use of the Turnitin.com service are described on the Turnitin.com website.
